ABOUT WCESC NURSING SERVICES

One on One Care Nursing

WCESC employs nurses who provide 1:1 care to students with complicated chronic health care needs throughout the school day. These nurses meet the student at home, get a report from the family or the student's at-home nurse in the morning, ride the bus to and from school with the student and spend the day with the student while continuously monitoring their condition and meeting their health care needs while at school. A few nurses meet their students when they arrive at school.

School Clinic Nursing

School clinic nurses are either a Licensed School Nurse (LSN) or are directed or supervised by an LSN to provide care for students in their building. Some tasks of the clinic nurse include providing first aid, coordinating care of students with chronic or acute health conditions, administering medications, performing health care procedures, training staff how to recognize and respond to common health-related emergencies, providing vision and hearing screenings, educating families, immunization surveillance, and collecting health data for required reports submitted to the Ohio Department of Health.

On May 22, members of the Blanchester District Autism Team—Joy Tubbs, PT; Carrie Nowak, OT; and Jenna Englehard, SLP—presented "Sensory Processing in Education: Understanding and Supporting Students" to all district staff. The engaging session emphasized the importance of sensory awareness in shaping student behavior and learning outcomes.

Staff explored their own sensory processing patterns through a sensory profile activity and reflected on how sensory input—like sound, touch, and movement—affects both students and educators. The presenters guided staff through foundational knowledge of sensory system development, regulation vs. dysregulation, and the scaffolding model of support.



Mentor Program

Coordinated Care & Central Clinic Mentoring Program: A Decade of Impact

For over ten years, **Coordinated Care** and the **Central Clinic Behavioral Health Mentoring Program** have worked in close partnership to support at-risk youth across Southwest Ohio. Originally launched under **Beech Acres**, the program transitioned to **Central Clinic Behavioral Health** approximately seven years ago, where it continues to thrive under the dedicated leadership of **Mike Cox**.

Mike has been at the helm of the program since its early days and is widely recognized as a driving force behind its long-standing success. Through his leadership, the program has consistently helped both boys and girls grow into responsible, productive adults.

Serving Hamilton, Butler, Warren, and Clinton counties, the program is partially funded by the Hamilton County Mental Health and Recovery Services Board and the Mental Health Recovery Board Serving Warren and Clinton Counties and by Warren Co. Family and Children First. It is a highly effective, community-based initiative designed for youth aged 7 to 17 who are at elevated risk for:

- Juvenile delinquency
- Negative peer relationships
- Academic failure
- Poor decision-making

Mentors in the program provide structured guidance, coaching, and support to help youth and their families develop essential life skills while addressing behavioral, emotional, and developmental challenges.

Coordinated Care has referred approximately **12–15 youth annually** to the program since its inception. Many of these young individuals have struggled to form meaningful connections, and the mentoring program has been a critical factor in helping them make healthier choices, avoid legal trouble, and reduce the need for psychiatric hospitalization.

Mentor Program Success Story Submitted by: Jeff Peters, Mentor

I have had the privilege of mentoring a young man through the Central Clinic Mentoring Program for several years. When we began, he struggled significantly with anger and antisocial behavior. He had been placed in residential treatment twice—once for attempting to set his home on fire, and again due to frequent outbursts that made him unmanageable at home and school.

At the time, he was enrolled in a behavioral school placement and later transitioned to a second specialized educational setting. He had difficulty forming friendships and was often disruptive in class. His behavior was manipulative, and he would react dramatically when things didn't go his way—for example, hiding under tables and crying loudly if lunch wasn't to his liking.

Through consistent mentoring and school-based counseling, he gradually learned coping strategies to manage his emotional dysregulation. Over time, and with occasional setbacks, he began to show real progress. I was told that our mentoring relationship provided the stability and consistency he needed to begin healing from a traumatic childhood.

Today, he is back in public school, earning awards for **citizenship and academic achievement**, and maintaining healthy relationships with both peers and family. He has developed strong moral and ethical values and continues to thrive. He is a powerful example of how **positive guidance and mentorship** can transform a young life.





Waynesville:




Little Miami:




Wellness Center






Miss Gina!

Hope Reins!







OVERALL TOP RECIPIENT chosen was Amanda Tudela, Waynesville High School. Amanda is the daughter of Mark and Jenna Tudela.










Amanda at the OESCA Statewide Program
